### **From The President's Corner – March 2015**

I want to thank all you memebers who showed up last month for the tool swap even though we missed getting out a Knothole last month. It tells me that you really are dedicated members of the Guild.

That reminds me, I don't know who or when the initials of our organization were first introduced as SWWG. The problem I have is that woodworkers is a compound word, not to separate words. Make ICT has just signed a lease for about 8600 square feet of space at 1500 E Douglas. Mike Hutton was asked to source the shop equipment and it sounds like it will be a great shop. Here a

list of some of the equipment he has ordered; 3 hp Saw Stop table saw, 15" thickness planer with helical carbide cutter, an 8" jointer with helical carbide cutter, Rockwell 14" bandsaw, 2 hp 17" Grizzly bandsaw, Delta wood lathe, Powermatic 6"x48"x12" sander, 12" miter saw, 17" drill press, spindle sander, slow speed grinder, WorkSharp, and a 5hp Onidea Dust collector. I think he even ordered a scroll saw.

For those of us who have our own shops we may not need access to this shop often but for those who are starting out, or don't have room for large equipment, this shop will be great.

It's going to take a lot of work to make this shop functional. They need work benches, stands, and saw extension as well as setting up each piece of equipment. If you have some item that might help, let Mike Hutton know what it is. Any item you donate will be tax deductible and will be a credit to membership in Make ICT. If you can donate time to building benches and setting up the shop that would also be appreciated and probably earn membership credit. I will be talking to their board to see if we can work out a club membership.

I still don't know how the space will be divided, so we aren't sure if they will have a space large

enough for our meetings. I'll let you know more as soon as I know.

One last item before I finish. I want to thank all of you for not carrying on private conversations during the programs. I think it has made the meetings much better.


