Earl W. Creel – Does recreational woodworking, mostly cabinetry.

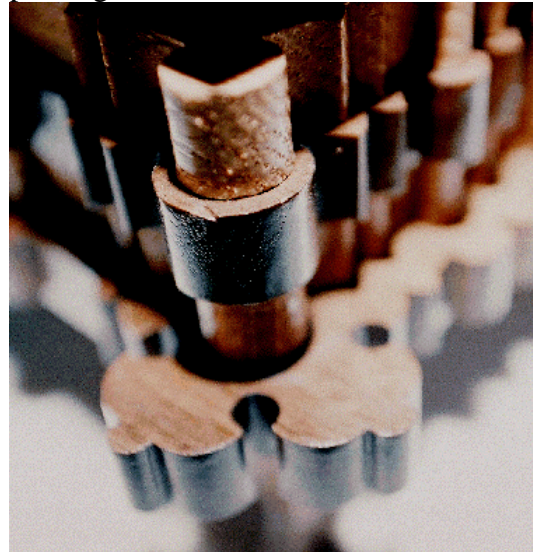
### Show and Tell

Dick Pearson a walnut/oak music box that he made using his scroll saw.

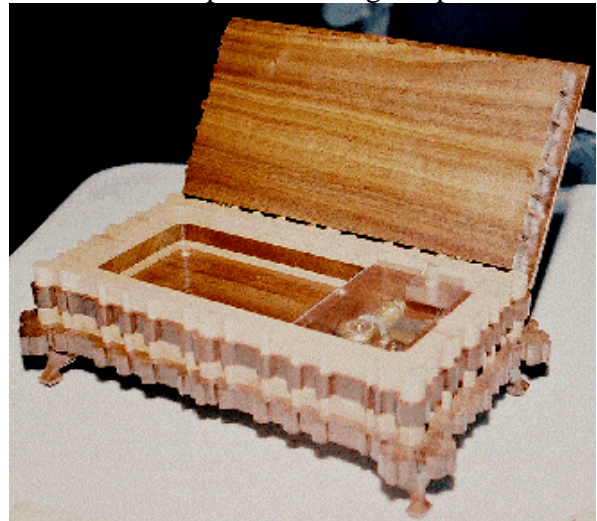


He said that usually he makes one of an object, shows it around and then the orders start

He said that he has found that “signed” pieces draw twice the price of unsigned pieces.



The unique hinges for the box were from Sloan Wood Working in Tennessee.

Dick also brought in a rocking chair he had



made from recycled cedar. He said that he got the plans for the rocker a Lowes.

**The Auction**

We auctioned off last years sideboard project. The auction started at the standing \$500 bid placed at the last meeting. There were several enthusiastic bidders so the price went up in a hurry. \$550, \$700,----\$900 ---\$1000, and finally \$1025. Bernely Asel was the eventual winner. Bernley took possession of the sideboard and it was delivered to his home immediately after the meeting.

**Last Month's Program**

The program was a continuation of our mini-program on how to build curved, raised panel doors.



Les brought jigs, improved versions of those that we had used to make the curved components of the doors before the last meeting. We will spline the doors together, so slots were cut on the insides of the stiles and on three sides of the rails. Les wants to teach us how to build some ornate “corner posts”, so Les asked for suggestions on for the continuation of the project. A jewelry box and corner cabinet were mentioned. A follow-up meeting was scheduled Saturday September 16 to finish up the doors and start on the corner posts.

**September 16 Workshop**

The usual cadre showed up plus a couple of new faces. The membership should take more advantage of these workshops. Consider them an extension of the monthly program. Usually everyone that comes has a good time and learns something.

We started by taking our previously made parts and tailoring them into door assemblies.





Then we started on the posts. First we used a router using a 13/8" round-over bit set to where the vertical cut was about 1/4" deep.



We ran the router down about 80% of the blanks on two adjacent sides. There was something magic about those blanks, they were rectangular instead of square. I think Les already has something figured out.



Then we used a scraper to form beads along the sides of the routed recess. The scraper we were using was a commercially available one with a set of standard inserts. Les told us we could make any profile we wanted by using a piece of hacksaw blade and forming the contour with a grinder or files.



Next came the continuation of the beads at the ends of the recess. We used radius templates to layout tangents to the end of the bead, then raised the beads using a 1/2" chisel.



We still need to decide what we are going to do with the doors (2) and posts. Come to the meeting with some ideas.
