
President's Corner

Updates

Guild Directory and photo IDs

February Program: Finger Joints

Steve Werner, an old guy that likes to make woodworking jigs, will present finger joint jigs

and techniques for the February guild program. This program will focus on uniform-sized finger joints rather than the non-uniform finger (box) joints that were demonstrated in previous guild programs.

The finger joint is a very strong joint due to the large glue surface area, and the joint can be a very attractive decorative joint (particularly with contrasting wood colors). With a proper table saw jig, the finger joint can be created very quickly and accurately with a minimal amount of tweaking. The finger joint jig is easy to make, is very inexpensive and is made using only a table saw.

One drawback to the uniformly-spaced finger joint is the remnant finger left over when the joint width is not a whole-number multiple of the finger width. Most woodworking literature does not describe a good solution for the "skeleton finger" situation other than trimming the stock to match the finger joint line. In the guild program, we will present three methods to eliminate the "skeleton finger" situation.

Another drawback to decorative joints (such as the figure joint) is touch and feel of the joint. No matter how smooth you make your finger joint, you will definitely feel the ridges in the joint as the wood moisture content changes with the seasons. One way to solve joint smoothness issue is to make the fingers blatantly un-smooth. In the program, we will demonstrate a technique for quickly cutting chamfers on proud fingers so smoothness becomes a non-issue and so the joint can make a bold statement. These chamfered proud fingers would not be applicable in all joint situations, but they certainly create a distinctive look.

The program will conclude with construction details of the finger joint jig(s). The first rule of jig making is "The jig should not take longer to build than the project on which you plan to use the jig". Hopefully the program will demonstrate a way to quickly make an accurate finger joint

jig that will be useful for many different sized finger joints. Please feel free to bring your finger joint questions, insights, successes or failures for follow-on discussion.

New Business:

David discussed where he wants the guild to go this year with some ideas like "let's make it the best it can be", "it's about us", "let's get excited about woodworking" and mostly, "let's have fun!"

David reported to the membership that the officers have had many meeting to discuss and plan for the year. Some of the goals for 2005 that were established are:

- 3) Establish mentoring program
- 4) Develop program agendas that have continuity

Galen distributed a questionnaire that he would like feedback on to investigate what programs and seminars the members would like to see presented this year. Lou Ortega asked for volunteers for completing 150 airplanes to be sold to City Arts for their fund-raising effort. The money raised by our involvement will be placed into the toy fund.

January 's Program

Larry Bell (owner), Julian Reyes (operations manager), Craig Ciemny (sales) and Shari (shop sharpener) hosted the meeting at Sharpening Specialists at 2124 S. Edwards. Sharpening Specialists does approximately 2 million dollars of business a year and is growing all of the time. They can sharpen any item with a cutting edge, blades, planer knives, joiner knives, end mills, drill bits, router bits, scissors, paper cutters, mortising chisels, if you can think of it, they can sharpen it. No size job is too small and big isn't a problem either, they can sharpen a saw blade over 4 foot in diameter! They also sell router bits and saw blades in a variety of manufacturers that the members would probably be interested in. Their sharpening services are sold thru a

sales route that takes them to Salina, eastern Missouri, Tulsa, OK City on a two week rotation. Larry has owned the business for about 8 years and has a workforce of 18, with most having 25-30 years experience in sharpening. Our hosts demonstrated re-toothing and sharpening a carbide saw blade, resetting the teeth on a hand saw, grinding planner knives along with other items. Almost all of the carbide saw sharpening is performed on CNC diamond wheel grinders for maintained accuracy and reduced costs. Larry said that grinding hasn't changed much in the last 75 years, but the abrasives used are constantly improving and changing. Much of the work done is using superabrasive wheels coated with diamond and cubic nitrite boron (CBN) which increase both feed and speed of cutting. If you need something sharpened, give them a try and let the other guild members know what you thought.

Meeting was adjourned at 9PM.


